AGM news

Back on Track

Our official launch of the lovingly restored Carriage 4 on the 29th May, was a very proud moment for HPHA and all of those who were involved in the project.

This initially started back in early 2020 when the carriage was taken out of service by BFF and moved to the workshop. The projected cost of repair and restoration was however considerable. As one of HPHA's key purposes is to protect and restore the pier including it's structures and railway, we undertook to take on this challenge but only after it was gifted to us by Lee Rayment of BFF.

At the same time, we were undertaking a project with Hythe Primary school, in which we highlighted the plight of these historic carriages. They then wrote 90 letters asking for financial support for the project to Beaulieu Beaufort Foundation, which were duly posted in a very large envelope. This was also followed up by a letter from HPHA. As a consequence we were awarded a grant for £10.000. The rest as they say is history.

The bulk of the work has been completed by the members of Hythe Shed (at the Pier) and the metalwork by engineers from BFF. The whole project has been ably led by Tina Brown .



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In addition, we held a naming ceremony for the tractor unit which has now been named 'Gerald Yorke', after the original consultant train engineer. We were honoured to welcome both Nigel Hasted and Sara Richardson, grandchildren of Gerald and Nigel kindly cut the ribbon.

This month in History - June

Second carriage for Hythe Pier Railway

Monday June 26, 1922

The second of two carriages for the shortly to be introduced tramway on Hythe Pier was dispatched from the Baguley Car Company of Burton-on-Trent. Baguley works order number 1048 arrived at Totton Railway Station two days before being forwarded on by road to Hythe. This carriage, (known as Carriage No.1), is at present in the Blue Funnel Ferries workshop at the pier being stripped back for restoration by HPHA in conjunction with the Shed (at the Pier).

Saturday June 30, 1883

The **South Hants Temperance Band** performed the following programme during the afternoon, on the pier at Hythe:-

Part I – Grand march, "Solferino" E Marie; overture, "L'Amour au Village" P Bouillon; valse, "Auf Immer" O Seydel; grand selection, "Gems of England" H Basquit; quadrille, "Le Joyeux Postillon" J Renyard.



Saturday June 1, 1945

LCP "Mary Celeste"

Bang! The Hythe Pier pontoon swayed giddily. Bumping against its side was the grey shape of an LCP (Landing Craft Personnel). The mate of the Hythe Ferry, Mr C Hosey, leapt aboard, expecting to find at the bottom of the craft, a man lying unconscious, perhaps overcome by engine fumes or injured.

But there was no one there. An empty boat.

Behind the craft there trailed a mooring rope. The Pier authorities contacted the port naval officials. Yes. They had lost a boat. Half an hour later the boat's owners came and claimed their missing craft.

Thursday June 15, 1978

First new Hythe Ferry boat for 31 years

The former Portsmouth ferry boat Southsea Queen arrives at Hythe Pier. Bought by the General Estates Company to replace the Hotspur II which had been sold to a Scottish

concern, the Southern Queen was renamed Hythe Hotspur in September 1978.

She was sold by White Horse Ferries, which had taken over the service in 1994, in 1999.
