Thanks to the grant giving bodies Anthony Smith

HPHA raises funds through a variety of means, with one of these being to apply for grants from grant giving bodies. This work is generally undertaken by the Grant Management Group within HPHA. We would like to recognise the organisations that have allocated grants to HPHA in 2021 and give you an overview of them.

Beaulieu Beaufort Foundation (BBF) gives local support for the aspiring individual and grass-roots community projects. BBF is supporting HPHA's restoration of Carriage 1 having previously supported the restoration of Carriage 4 that was completed earlier in 2021.

Dibden Allotment Fund (DAF) supports organisations operating within the Waterside area that support individuals living within the Parishes of Hythe, Dibden, Fawley & Marchwood. DAF supports restoration of Carriage 1 and indirectly, the work of Hythe Shed (at the pier).

Hythe and Dibden Parish Council operates a grants scheme for voluntary and non-profit making groups who are involved in community projects and initiatives that are of benefit to the communities in Hythe and Dibden. The grant was paid as a community grant and has been used to support the restoration of Carriage 1.

Foyle Foundation (FF) supports organisations operating in the United Kingdom, especially those working at grass roots and local community level, in any field, across a wide range of activities. FF are supporting HPHA

New Forest Parks Authority (NFPA) Sustainable Communities Fund has supported the restoration of Carriage 1. Since 2006 it has awarded £2.4m in grants to over 300 projects that help improve the sustainability of the National Park.

Beaverbrook Foundation has increasingly concentrated on supporting small charitable projects. The grant has been directed to restoration of Carriage 1.

Restoring and rebuilding continues



The brilliant team at The Shed at The Pier continue to make progress on Carriage 1, our next train carriage to be restored. This picture shows complete new frames being made for one side of the carriage (not door side) where existing could not be salvaged. The Engineers at Blue Funnel Ferries are restoring the wheels and bogies along with making a new sub frame for this carriage, this should be ready for our wood working experts to begin the rebuild in 3-4 weeks.

It is amazing to see all these skilled craftsmen working so hard to bring another carriage back on track, a big thank you to all The Team!

Friday December 31, 1880 - The new Hythe Pier

Excitement was growing on New Year's Eve 1880, as the new Hythe Pier, that had been being built over the previous 18 months, would be officially opened for business the following day.

There is documentary evidence that the steamers had trialled the landing stages during the course of the build, but for the first time in the history using the Hythe Ferry would be from a guaranteed dry landing point.

Apart from a couple of months in 2003, Hythe Pier would be open to serve the public to this present day.

Friday December 6, 1907 – Kaiser Wilhelm II of Germany visits Hythe Pier

There was great excitement in Hythe as word circulated that Kaiser Wilhelm II had arrived at the pier by motor car during the late morning and proceeded to walk to the end to board a launch to take him to the German Royal Yacht Hohenzollern, that had been anchored off Netley.



Large crowds assembled at the pier entrance as it became clear that the German Emperor would return during the afternoon. As he walked back along the pier towards a waiting car, a group of school-children ran down the pier but were swiftly "put in order" before reaching the Royal party.

Thursday December 22, 1977 – Building of New Hythe Ferry Boat stopped.

A new ferry boat for the Hythe Ferry at the early stages of construction was stopped when the shipbuilders Marine Services Ltd of Hythe went out of business. Workers were not paid

and were to face Christmas on the dole.



General Estates Ltd, owners of the ferry service instead bought the Gosport ferry boat Southsea Queen the following summer and renamed her Hythe Hotspur.

Friday December 17, 1999 – Hythe Pier Train, Record Breaker

Our iconic pier train received the accolade of an entry into the Guinness Book of Records for being "The oldest operating pier train".

As we all know, next year we will celebrate the centenary of its entry into service.
