Keeping up to date with HPHA Projects

HPHA has undertaken many different pieces of work, both large and small, on Hythe pier, the pier buildings and railway. We call these pieces of restoration or repair work "projects". Many of these projects have been easy to recognise and their completion has been celebrated at a large public event, such as the "Back On Track" event in May 2021. "Back On Track" celebrated the end of projects that saw the return to service of restored train carriage 4 and train tractor unit 1.

Other projects may be invisible and happen out of the public eye. An example would be the repairs to the building and roof which houses the waiting room. Unless you noticed the scaffolding in place during the work it is unlikely that you know about this project.

To date HPHA has run 19 separate projects and spent, or committed to spend, £180,000 in total on them. A lot of work and projects have been already completed but several are currently in progress, including, for example, a viability/initial design study for the restoration of the whole Pier, and another to restore the next train carriage (known as Carriage 2).

So that our community can have the best information on our work, we have developed a new part of our website to list all of our projects. The projects are listed in reverse chronological order. Clicking on the "Read More" button (available on every short project synopsis) will lead to a page with further details of that specific project.

Viability study

In preparation for major fundraising for the large scale restoration of the pier and buildings, we have launched the Viability Study project. This study aims to assess the approach to restoration and develop a list of the likely costs of doing the work. This study is funded by the The Charles Burnett Memorial Fund (see poster elsewhere in this newsletter) and funds raised by HPHA from our community events.

The viability study project consists of a series of disparate "sub-projects", all aiming to answer different questions relating to the future restoration. As an example of such a sub-project, you may have noticed that half way along the pier are small prisms and holders attached to the pier. These are part of a monitoring sub project checking for small movements in the pier. Information gained from this monitoring project will help us determine how much money may be needed to handle any movement detected during the restoration.

Once all parts of the viability project are complete HPHA will build plan that outlines the cost of restoration and how we might go about the work. These documents will be the basis for conversations with potential funding organisations.

Funded by The Charles Burnett Memorial Fund

Charles Burnett (1956-2018) resided at Newtown Park House, near Lymington in Hampshire and was very well known locally as the land-speed record holder for a steam-powered car, which he had developed at his house alongside a team of engineers. Prior to setting the steam car record, he was the class II offshore power boat champion between 1993 and 1996.

The Charles Burnett Memorial Fund has been established by the family of the late Charles Burnett, to assist charitable projects and resources across the area where he lived.

In his lifetime, Charles supported many worthwhile causes and this new £1 million fund will continue his great charitable legacy, meeting the needs of future generations in our communities and providing a lasting memorial in Charles's name.

Charles was a generous philanthropist, enthusiastically supporting a wide range of local charitable causes.

Of course being a narrow gauge train expert, one of their locomotives and carriages were on a track and yes, open to rides by all!

Carriage 2 Restoration Underway

Carriage 2 (Asset 1327) is at present in the Blue Funnel workshop. Volunteers from the Hythe Shed (at the Pier) have removed the seating and have started the disassembly of the bodywork.

As with those in the two previously restored carriages, the slatted seating has been found to be in good condition and will accordingly be replaced, needing just a deep clean and revarnishing.

This carriage carried King George VI along the pier in May 1944 during his visit to the area to inspect the vessels being assembled for the impending D Day landings.

Perhaps, one day, our new King Charles III might follow in his grandfather's footsteps.
