Hythe Pier Heritage Association 2022 – The Year in Review

2022 been a busy year for HPHA, much has been achieved.

January – Accepted as one of the projects supported under the Tesco Grants Scheme. Shoppers at the Sizer Way store were invited to drop tokens into the box of their choice, each supporting a local project. An award of £500 was subsequently received.

February – Jill Gower and Alan Titheridge representing HPHA went into Orchard Infants School to talk with Year 2 pupils about its work and plans for Hythe Pier as part of the school's "Communities Week". The children showed great interest and enthusiasm, subsequently visiting the pier and riding the train to the pier head, where Jill and Alan held a questions and answers session. Following the school visit, the children had made postcards, coasters and candle holders which they sold to the public at the pier entrance, raising £783 for the pier restoration project.

April – Jill Gower, Mary King and Ann Fairhead attended the Hythe Marina Association boat jumble and car boot sale. HMA had nominated HPHA as its charity of the year and raised over £400 from the event. HPHA raised a further £280 selling merchandise.

May – HPHA announced work was about to commence on replacing the first 43 metres of track from the shore end station along with the points and sidings. The project would entail lifting the exist rails, conductor rail and their timber supports before replacement timber and subsequently newly fabricated rails be put in place. The existing platform would also be replaced with a temporary platform 45 metres towards the seaward end. HPHA acknowledges generous donations from Hampshire County Council, Beaulieu Beaufort Trust, Beaverbrook Foundation, Dibden




Allotment Fund and the New Forest Park Authority that allowed this important and necessary work to be carried out.

June – Carriage 1 (Asset 1048), the second to be restored rolled out of the Blue Funnel workshop. Volunteers from the Shed (at the Pier) had been working enthusiastically on it since the previous September, despite Covid lockdowns. There was still finishing work to be carried out, with a confidence it would be complete in time for the Hythe Pier Railway centenary celebrations in July.

HPHA, as a recipient of a share of the event fundraising, took a stand at the Fawley Show.





July – Rock the Pier and the Centenary Celebration was the most ambitious and successful HPHA event so far, raising £8500. A centenary cake was cut as a part of the celebration during the late morning followed by free rides on the train. A model railway exhibition was held in the Community Centre and the volunteers from the Shed (at the Pier) were on hand to talk about their contribution to the Carriage 1 restoration.

Rock the Pier saw local musicians donating their time on a stage on the Promenade. In fine weather, the audience rocked for the seven hours show. HPHA acknowledges sponsorship from the Scratch Project, Maples, Zillwoods Signs, General Estates Company, PPL Prs and The Lord Nelson.

Earlier in the month HPHA hosted a visit to the pier by members of the Industrial Railway Society.

August – Jill Gower, Mary King, Anne Fairhead and Alan Titheridge were present (as onlookers) on behalf of HPHA at a Waterside Bowling Club tournament. HPHA is the Club's President's Charity of the Year.

September – Work underway to disassemble Carriage 2, the carriage that transported King George VI along the pier in 1944 and that was decommissioned into the Blue Funnel workshop prior to Rock the Pier, in preparation for its restoration, expected to last into the summer of 2023.

October – HPHA "flew the flag" at the Solent Sky Tram and Light Railway Exhibition.

November – Safety fencing erected at the pier entrance as work began in earnest on the first phase of the track replacement project.
