Restoration work continues on both Carriage 3 (A driving carriage) and Tractor number 2. There has been a slight delay in progress awaiting wheel sets, suspension arm repairs and sprockets which we are pleased to say are back and ready to reassemble the tractor and move out of the workshop to enable continuation works to Carriage 3.

The volunteers at Hythe Shed (at the pier) are eager to assemble Carriage 3 after completing the side panels, roof, seats etc and see their hard work take form. The chassis to this carriage does need a few lengths of metal runs, delivery of these are usually very quick and together with ongoing cleaning up of nuts/bolts, we are sure that the chassis will be ready very soon.

Being a driving carriage, there are other elements to the train carriage, apart from new cabling for electrics, there is confidence among the engineers that the breaking system and gearing is in good order which is fantastic to hear.

We at HPHA are very proud of all volunteer achievements showing such craftsmanship skills on the previous carriages, we simply cannot wait to show off the next one, together with a fully restored tractor number 2.

Pier project update John Goddard

Track Renovation - Phase 1

The track renovation project was paused towards the end of last year when it was discovered that one of the two Victorian wrought iron riveted girders (the one supporting the railway line and partially buried in shingle) was so badly corroded that it was no longer bearing the rail loads. Due to the Grade 11 listing of the pier, any replacement of this beam requires Planning Consent. Our initial preliminary proposal to replace beam was not viewed favourably by the NFDC Planning Officer during a site visit in February. However he was sympathetic to our cause and it was agreed that we would submit a proposal that enabled the wrought iron girders to remain in place with the loads being taken by new adjacent beams.

The revised steelwork drawings from our Architects SGP, were issued last month, reflecting the recommendation of the Conservation Officer. SGP submitted the Full Planning Application at the end of May, and this was validated on 6th June with a target date for the determination of 1st August. The end of the consultation period is 7th July, at which point SGP will be in touch with the council to try and gauge their thoughts, which should give an idea of whether it is likely to be approved. On the basis of the Planning Application being approved by 1st August, we should be looking to install the new beams early September, which will then be followed on by the re-commencement of first phase of the railway line upgrade.

Monitoring Survey

Historically, there has been significant settlement of certain piles about two thirds of the way along the pier, which is very evident when viewing the railway line in this area. Previous remedial works had been carried, but it was uncertain as to whether further settlement of these piles still continuing. We therefore, last year, commissioned a Digital Monitoring Survey to measure the levels in this area over the course of a year. The latest results from the Survey carried out in April, confirmed that over the last year there has been no significant change in the levels at the various monitoring points. As the train has been in full use during this time, it appears safe to assume that we have no 'live' settlement issues at the piles in question and can consider that future further settlement of these piles is unlikely. Future remedial works are therefore not required other than to level up the superstructure when that section of the railway track is upgraded. No further monitoring is now required. In conclusion, a good result.





Renewable energy study ends

As reported on our website, HPHA suggested to Solent University that Hythe pier would be a suitable location to understand how renewable energy might be used in the re-development of a heritage building. This report investigated the possibility of using renewable energy to power the buildings and train on the Hythe Pier. Comprehensive assessment of available renewable energy sources was carried out which led to the selection of wind and solar energy for further inspection and application. Specific devices have been selected for the four main system components – solar module, wind turbine, power inverter and battery pack.

Included are also recommendations on additional system components to enable a comprehensive simulation and guide us on the electrical system design.



A numerical estimation was completed to establish the potentially available energy and create advice on project feasibility. A through assessment of the buildings energy consumption and efficiency has been carried out to determine the average daily consumption of the Pier. Several options of energy storage were considered (both type and scale) and the system behaviour was simulated to obtain accurate data on system autonomy and energy requirements. Numerical methods and simulation show that the energy production is poorly distributed throughout the year and therefore – although there is enough harvestable energy for a stand- alone system – the national grid needs to be used as a top-up in the colder months.

Multiple potential arrangement options were introduced and assessed explaining the advantages and disadvantages of each arrangement. A succinct cost-benefit analysis was also completed to evaluate the financial feasibility of the project.

The report concludes on recommending a combined system option including wind turbines and solar panels as well as storage giving up to 1 day of autonomy and a necessary national grid connection for overnight charging.

The report has now been completed with two of HPHA's Directors attending the presentation day at the university.

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School children learn Hythe Pier history Alan Titheridge

Forty children from Wildground Junior School were taught some of the history and statistics of Hythe Pier and its century old railway as a part of their local history project during a visit on June 15th. Jill Gower and myself from Hythe Pier Heritage Association were on hand to explain previous roles of the pierhead buildings and the introduction of the train.

Courtesy of Blue Funnel Ferries, the children were given a free train ride and were asked how people used to get along the pier before the train. It was explained that for the first 40 years people had to walk until in 1909 trolleys on sunken tracks were introduced. These trolleys were for goods and luggage, but often the porter would who pushed the trolleys would let ladies sit on for a ride.

During their visit to the village, the children were also shown old photographs they could compare with the modern Hythe they were walking around after their visit to the pier.
